

RESPONSES TO SURVEY OF MARKET PARTICIPANTS

Markets Group, Federal Reserve Bank of New York



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The **Survey of Market Participants** is formulated by the Trading Desk at the Federal Reserve Bank of New York to enhance policymakers' understanding of market expectations on a variety of topics related to the economy, monetary policy and financial markets. The questions involve only topics that are widely discussed in the public domain and never presume any particular policy action. FOMC participants are not involved in the survey's design.

For most questions, median responses across participants, along with the 25th and 75th percentiles, are reported. For questions that ask respondents to give a probability distribution, the average response across participants for each potential outcome is reported.¹ Brief summaries of the comments received in free response form are also provided.

Responses were received from 27 market participants. Except where noted, all 27 participants responded to each question. In some cases, participants may not have provided complete responses (e.g. may not have provided forecasts extending to the same time horizon as requested in the survey). In these instances, the number of respondents who answered all parts of the question is indicated.

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- 1a) Provide below your expectations for changes, if any, to the language referencing each of the following topics in the July FOMC statement. Please write N/A if you do not expect any changes.

Current economic conditions:

Some respondents indicated they expected a reference to a slowdown of economic activity. Some respondents indicated they expected continued reference to elevated or increasing inflation, and some indicated they expected continued reference to low unemployment. Some respondents indicated they expected little or no change.

Economic outlook and communication on the expected path of the target federal funds rate:

Many respondents indicated they expected little or no change. Several respondents indicated they expected continued reference to ongoing rate increases being appropriate or some indication of further rate tightening.

Communication on tools other than the target federal funds rate:

Most respondents indicated they expected little or no change.

Respondents did not provide significant commentary in this section.

- 1b) What are your expectations for the Chair's press conference?

Many respondents indicated they expected the Chair to reaffirm the FOMC's commitment to returning inflation to its 2 percent objective. Several respondents indicated they expected the Chair to reference low unemployment. Several respondents expected the Chair to reference further rate increases.

Please explain:

Some respondents noted that FOMC participants were not as clear or consistent in their communications. Several respondents cited a perceived shift in forward guidance before the June FOMC, and several respondents suggested that the Committee appeared overly sensitive to individual data prints. Some respondents viewed FOMC communications favorably, citing a focus on inflation.

Some respondents indicated they changed their modal expectations for the target range for the federal funds rate compared with their prior survey response due to higher realized inflation. Several respondents attributed changes in their policy expectations to communications by FOMC officials

and several others cited a greater perceived risk of tightening leading to a growth slowdown.

In explaining changes to their recession probabilities, many respondents cited the tightening of monetary policy or financial conditions, and some mentioned the softening of economic activity data during the first half of 2022. Some respondents noted inflationary pressures or realized inflation as a driver of their assessed higher recession probability, and several respondents cited international factors.
